### Bigleaf Maple (Acer macrophyllum)

There are a bunch of these around the overpass that connects the main campus to the train station. It is very funny that they are called bigleaf maples, because that is their primary characteristic! I noticed the huge maple leaves on the ground and was very surprised that they had come from such little trees! I love these guys!

### Atlas Cedar (Cedrus atlantica)

The cones on this tree are enormous + pretty typical of a cedar, but I had never seen one before! I spent a lot of time trying to figure out what it was because its needles are reminiscent of a spruce, but the cones grow up like a fir.

Monkey Puzzle Tree (Araucaria araucana) I have never seen a tree like this! I was very lost when I found it + it was a wild

surprise! They are native to the Chilean Andes, but can grow all the way up the Pacific coast. I didn't see any cones on this one, but I will keep an eye out!

## Coast Silktassel (Garrya elliptica)

They've got these beautiful strings of flowers that are pretty dried out at this time of year, but still just incredibly cool! The leaves are like holly leaves but not spiky, waxed and curved in ripples. They are not native so far north but this one is doing really well!

All we knew going in was that it would be a singlecolored sock, and that it would be based on Albrecht Durer's engraving, Melencolia. It was my second mkal, and I had a lovely time. I finished the first sock shortly after the last clue was released in late September, but only made one sock because I only had one ball of yarn + it was wound so I could only access one end of it. I considered a bunch of different solutions to that problem but eventually decided to Just calm down about it and knit one sock at a time.

As it turned out, that would have been a good idea because I did not have enough yarn for both socks, which I realized maybe <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of the way through sock 1. I decided to just finish sock 1, knit as much of sock 2 as possible, and then unwind as much of sock 1 as I need to make them match. It went well!
