Thoughts:

Shortly before beginning this challenge I went looking for queer mysteries, which is reflected in a number of these titles - The Affair of the Mysterious Letter, Lavender House, The Mimicking of Known Successes, The Missing Page. But there were a number of books I would not have read if not for the prompts.



<u>The Membranes</u>, by Chi Ta-Wei, is a foundational work of gay Taiwanese science fiction from the nineties, a genre with which I had no experience at all. The first English translation was published in 2021, and I am very interested in the idea of a book becoming widely accessible to a new audience twentyfive years after its initial publication. The story itself was a little grotesque for my taste - I dislike descriptions of skin, which this book is full of. But it is full of twists, which I enjoyed, and the narrator's voice is charming and complex. It is one that I have thought about a lot since reading it.

<u>Friday Black</u>, by Nana Kwame Adjei-Brenyah, is similarly disturbing and compelling. It is a collection of short stories, set largely in various retail environments, which add surreal but recognizable distortions to everyday life. They are chilling in their portrayals of race and class relations. I particularly enjoyed a pair of stories toward the end of the book which described the same environment from two different characters' points of view. I really enjoy the feeling of slowly figuring out what's going on in a story, which this collection delivered multiple times.





Lavender House is certainly in my wheel house in terms of genre, but I had not heard of it before I saw it on a list of libraryrecommended books and I would probably not have picked it up based solely on its cover. It delivers on the alienation the protagonist feels in a house full of strangers, one of whom is a murderer, which is frequently elided in mysteries. I enjoyed the juxtaposition of that sensation with the isolation of being a gay cop in the 1950s. I enjoy a mystery that is Only a mystery, but it was interesting to read a book where the detective has more interiority.

The Recipe I Made Recently that Juno Liked Best

Garlicky Leaf, Stem, and Core Pesto by Tamar Adler, from *The Everlasting Meal*

Ingredients:

- 4 to 5 cups stems, leaves, and cores of cauliflower, broccoli, kale, collard greens, Swiss chard, cabbage, sliced or diced into ½-inch pieces
- 🖆 3 cloves garlic
- [▲] ½ cup olive oil
- 🖆 ¼ tsp salt
- 🛤 water

Instructions:

Put everything in a pot just big enough to hold it and add water to cover by half. Cook it at below a simmer until anything you prod with a wooden spoon is smashable. Keep just enough water in the pot to make sure the bottom's not burning, adding a little water as you need it. When everything is soft, puree it quickly in a blender or food processor, or simply smash it with a wooden spoon until you get tired, leaving moments of appealing, irregular texture.

This is delicious dolloped on toast and grated with Parmesan, or treated as a side dish and served with fish or meat, or, with a cup of Parmesan added, mixed with hot pasta.

Added lemon juice, salt + pepper. Makes enough for 2 lb pasta.
